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

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DEMA 1997

We've just come back from a busy two weeks in Central Florida. Our official reason for having gone was to attend the 1997 Diving Equipment & Marketing Association (DEMA) Show, but we managed to squeeze in a swim with some manatees in Crystal River, a one-mile drift snorkel/dive in the Rainbow River (more on this in the next issue, if the photos turn out well), as well as all the regular amusement parks in the Orlando area. Our 19 month daughter now knows Mickey Mouse ("Baaah!", as she calls him) by sight, and makes painfully sure we're aware when she's spotted him.

DEMA '97 was held at the Orlando Convention Center from January 9th through the 12th, and featured 750 exhibitors, dozens of seminars, and an expected 15,000 attendees. Admission to the annual show is limited to members of the Dive industry, which means dive shop owners and employees, dive instructors, the press (editors, writers, etc.),

manufacturers of dive equipment, dive resort operators and employees, and dive travel agents. Consumers are not permitted at the show, as DEMA (the organization) feels that would seriously impair the ability of exhibitors to conduct business with their buyers - primarily dive shops. As it stands now, when price lists are given out at the show, they list dealer or wholesale prices, and suggested retail prices. Understandably, both dealers and manufacturers would prefer that such information is not made readily available to consumers. In respect of that concern, don't expect to see any such information published here.



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
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

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Jacques Cousteau at DEMA by Jake Richter

At a charity dinner benefitting Ocean Futures (<http://www.oceanfutures.org>), the father of recreational diving, Captain Jacques Cousteau, received the Oceanus Award. He was given the award in honor of his unswerving and on-going commitment to environmental awareness and protection.

The evening started with a slide show courtesy of Chris Neubert and Birgitte Wilms, renowned underwater photographers. After some introductory remarks by John Englander, Ocean Futures' Chairman, famed underwater photographer and videographer Bob Talbot took the podium. Talbot gave an emotionally charged presentation about the threats our oceans face from pollution and mass-fishing techniques. Driving home his points were vivid, and oft frightening pictures he has taken over the years, showing, among other things, the horrifying impact of gill nets on seals and birds.

The evening ended with Cousteau's award. While Cousteau is now 86 years old, he didn't show his years. While getting frailer in body, his voice during his acceptance speech was strong, and identical to the voice we have all heard in the many Cousteau TV specials we have seen over the years.

In an emotional plea to all in attendance, Cousteau urged us all to continue trying to find ways to save our oceans, but also not forget that a large number of our planet's citizens don't have fresh water to drink, and meanwhile leading nations use fresh water to flush toilets. "It makes me sick", he said. Cousteau also asked for help in funding Calypso II, his new research vessel to replace the accidentally sunk original Calypso.

While we didn't join the line of people seeking autographs, standing within 10 feet of the man who

brought us scuba diving was quite inspiring, and an evening we will never forget.

1997 - Year of the Reef

The United Nations has proclaimed 1997 the *Year of the Reef*, and that theme was heavily utilized by a number of exhibitors at the show. There were a large number of marine environmental organizations at the show using this theme as well, including DEMA's own Ocean Futures, Reef Relief, the Cousteau Society, the Coral Reef Alliance, and the Nature Conservancy. While conservation groups focused on the extensive threats our world's reefs face from pollution, toxins, cyanide and dynamite fishing, among others. Dive equipment makers meanwhile showed how their equipment might help divers better avoid reef contact. (It should be noted that the amount of damage reefs suffer from divers is dwarfed by the damage things like pollution and fishing do, but nonetheless, every little bit helps towards keeping our reefs alive.)

Gas Separation Membrane Patent

At DEMA '97, Undersea Breathing Systems (UBS) of Lake Worth, Florida, announced that it is expecting to receive a patent on its gas separation membrane technology for the production of oxygen enriched breathing gases, like Nitrox. UBS has been marketing their technology under the name DNAX. The purpose of their announcement was to warn other companies that use similar technology to produce Nitrox and other mixed gas blends for diving that they may be infringing UBS's forthcoming patent. The company stated that it will take all steps necessary to protect all its rights when the patent issues. However, until the patent is issued, it's not clear exactly what it covers, and therefore how it may or may not affect other manufacturers.

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Exhibiting

This year's highlights include Stan Waterman's World Premiere of his latest work, "Fiji with the Nai'a"; Brian Skerry's latest work "Mythical Atlantic"; and a wide variety of workshops and presentations on Saturday and Sunday.

We have a lovely new exhibit booth which you can see at the banquet to house a video display as well as underwater finds. 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

Ice Diving

Penetrating the frozen canopy of a lake is a team sport that requires its participants be mentally and physically prepared for their adventure. People assume that under the ice is a dark, claustrophobic world. Those that have previously made the journey can tell you there is as much light as on a bright cloudy day. The ice canopy is no more visually confining than open water. Of course it is necessary to enter and exit using the same hole or risk bumping your head on the smooth underside of the ice.

The potentially most disturbing part of diving under the ice is the probability of an equipment malfunction. The low temperatures cause ice to form in places that can block the normal flow of air. The air expanding from the confines of a SCUBA tank requires heat which it pulls from the surroundings. In the second stage of the SCUBA regulator this can cause water to freeze in the control valve resulting in a "free flow." Other prime candidates are the first stage of the SCUBA regulator and inflator hoses. Depending on the severity of the free flow a tank of air can be emptied in 5 minutes or less and a sticky inflator hose can result in an uncontrolled ascent. Participants need to mentally prepare in advance for these equipment problems. Experience suggests that divers should not breathe from their regulator until underwater. In addition a couple of healthy exhalations through the regulator just prior to submerging might provide a little extra heat. Once underwater a slow breathing rate will help to prevent a free flow.

It is desirable to keep the people and equipment involved in the event as warm and cozy as possible. The colder the surface temperature the greater the physical and mental challenge. All moisture needs to be purged from dive equipment prior to hauling onto the ice or it will freeze solid. Participants must be warmly dressed, wear waterproof boots and be well fueled. The dive site can be very windy. A bright sunny day may call for sunscreen. A hardy

breakfast with both carbohydrates and protein will best prepare you for the days activity. If the weather is particularly nasty check with Wayne Russell or Lea Nichols the night before the event. If there is a major snow storm or the air temperature is less than 10 degrees F the event will likely be rescheduled.

Divers must attend an ice diving training session offered by UDNH or a nationally recognized agency. All divers planning to participate must contact Lea Nichols at 487-2726 or Wayne Russell at 669-7124 prior to the event.
